

## **Preface**

Harford Glen is unique. Historically, its origins date to the early settlement of the county and architecturally there still exist structures going back to the nineteenth century. Topologically, there are wetlands, stream valleys, forested hillsides, meadows, and, along part of Plumtree Run, a beautiful gorge. Ecologically, there are twenty-nine species of mammals, more than one hundred twenty-five varieties of birds, seventeen different reptiles and amphibians, ten kinds of butterflies and dragonflies, and more than five hundred fifty varieties of plants, including forty different wildflowers.

## And best of all – it is an outdoor educational classroom room for the students of Harford County.

This book begins with the original one-thousand-acre land patent known as *Clagett's Forrest* and traces the history of the land first developed by the Hollingsworth family. The farm known as *Glen Echo*, where the present-day historic structures are, had almost a dozen owners before it was turned over to the Harford County Board of Education in 1948. These families are chronicled.

As well, the Hollingsworth factory that gave Wheel Road its name is covered, along with several legends about how nearby Ring Factory Road received its unusual name. All the existing historic buildings are discussed, placing them in context of when they were an essential part of farm life.

The last chapter deals with the Harford Glen Environmental Education Center today and outlines the vision the leaders share for making it even better for tomorrow.

The path from its first settlement to today's Environmental Education Center was a long journey and not without setbacks and disappointments. But the visionaries persevered and the county's future leaders richly benefit from their dedicated and tenacious work. In 1998 the Glen commemorated fifty years of being in the school system and in 2004 celebrated twenty-five years of residential outdoor education. This is that story for you to enjoy and more importantly – to celebrate.
